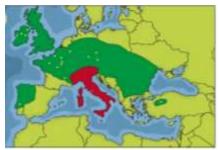

Julius Caesar joined the Roman Army in 81 BCE and was the first Roman army commander to invade England which he did in 55 BCE and again in 54 BCE.

While Julius Caesar was the dictator of Rome, he changed the calendar! He organised it so there would be 365 days in a year and 366 on leap years. The month of July is named after him.

305 CE

55 and 54 BCE Julius Caesar attempted to invade Britain but failed both times.

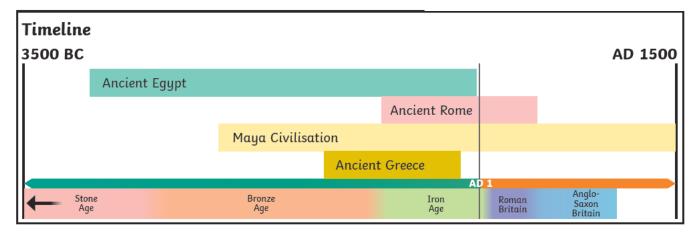
27 BCE Octavian became the first emperor of Rome and called himself Augustus. He tried to invade Britain but failed.

41 CE Claudius was named Emperor of Rome.

43 CE Emperor Claudius launched his successful invasion of Britannia. Many Celts realised how powerful this Roman army was and agreed to obey Roman laws and pay taxes. Other tribes of Celts continued to fight against the Romans, who never gained full control of Britain.

60 CE The Romans decided that the Iceni tribe needed to start paying taxes but Queen Boudicca, ruler of the tribe, refused to let this happen and formed an army to fight the Romans. Thousands of people died in these battles but the Romans eventually won.

122 CE The Romans wanted a way to separate their land from the Picts so the Roman emperor, Hadrian, ordered a wall to be built to protect the Romans' land. The wall was 117km long with castles, guarded turrets, major forts, barracks, bathhouses and even hospitals.



The Romans built elaborately designed Roman baths where people would go to relax and socialise.

The Romans were famous for building long, straight roads to transport legions, supplies, trading good and messages from the emperor.

Much of our knowledge about pre-Roman and Roman Britain comes from information recorded by the Romans themselves. They spoke and wrote in Latin.
